CALL FOR PAPERS

This is your opportunity to have your work published in the Gray's Inn Student Law Journal. The Journal will be circulated to barristers and students at all four Inns, as well as to law schools around the country and further afield. We intend to publish both electronic and print editions.

We are looking for a mixture of articles, case-notes and reviews on any legal area, be it a current debate, or something you simply think readers would find interesting. Submissions should be between 3,000 and 5,000 words, although case-notes and reviews may well be shorter. One way of contributing is to repurpose any outstanding work from your legal education to date; another is to craft a submission from scratch. All articles will be read by somebody with knowledge of your chosen field.

It is strongly advised that you submit an article for publication. If you are seeking pupillage, or even planning on further legal education, having your work published in the Journal will bolster your academic profile and make any applications stand out.

Submissions must be from current student members of Gray's Inn and will be considered on a rolling basis until 1 May 2016 for publication in the summer. If, however, you want to receive a decision on your submission before the closing of the Pupillage Gateway (4 May 2016), please submit your work by **25 March 2016**.

Please email all submissions to AGISJournal@graysinn.org.uk. Your work should conform to the attached style guide. If your submission is selected for publication, you will be required to sign a declaration stating that your work is entirely your own, and that you have the right to submit it for publication.

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STYLE GUIDE

The Journal uses OSCOLA as its house style. Accordingly, please ensure that your submissions conform to the following guidelines on presentation:

- References should be in numbered footnotes (not endnotes). You should not include a bibliography.
- Apart from references, footnotes should be kept to a minimum.
- Cases:
 - Case names should be italicised in the body of the article, with the case citation in a footnote. Neutral citation should be stated first if possible, following by reference to the appropriate law report.
 - Citations should be positioned at the end of sentences, unless there are multiple citations within a sentence, or if it would otherwise be inappropriate.
 - Where possible, paragraph numbers should be used when pinpointing citations of judgments.
 - Immediately subsequent citations of cases may use 'ibid.' followed by the appropriate paragraph/page number. Later citations of the same case may use a short form of the case name followed by the reference.
- Books and articles:
 - A full reference to a book or article should be included in a footnote on the first occasion it is cited.
 - Subsequent references should use solely the author's surname and the page reference. However, if multiple works by the same author are being used, a short form of the book or article's title should be present.

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EXAMPLES OF CITATION

Immediately subsequent citation (of any source)	The approach to the proprietary claim in <i>Versailles</i> ² ... <hr/> ² <i>ibid</i> [129]-[154].
Case Later citation	...however, Lord Neuberger doubted this approach. ¹⁸ <hr/> ¹⁸ <i>Versailles</i> , [73].

Book 1 st citation	This is the first reference to a particular book. ¹ <hr/> ¹ Lon L. Fuller, <i>The Morality of Law</i> (Yale UP 1964) 61.
Journal 1 st citation	This is a first reference to a particular article. ² <hr/> ² Paul Craig, 'Sovereignty of the United Kingdom Parliament after <i>Factortame</i> ' [1991] YEL 221, 248.
Subsequent citation	This is a subsequent reference to a book. ⁶ <hr/> ⁶ Fuller 125.
Subsequent citation (multiple works by same author)	This is a subsequent reference to a journal when multiple works by the same author are used. ⁷ <hr/> ⁷ Craig, 'Sovereignty of the UK Parliament' 241.
